¹ Has anyone believed us or seen the mighty power of the Lord in action? ² Like a young plant or a root that sprouts in dry ground, the servant grew up obeying the Lord. He wasn't some handsome kina. Nothing about the way he looked made him attractive to us. ³ He was hated and rejected: his life was filled with sorrow and terrible suffering. No one wanted to look at him. Worth the Cost

Think of the most expensive thing you ever purchased. Maybe it was a house or car for the family, a TV for your bedroom, or the latest and greatest Apple product.

Did you have to make any sacrifices in your budget to make the purchase happen?

Perhaps you didn't go on a family vacation that year or maybe you had to save your allowances for an entire year—sacrifices that were hard, but worth the reward of the purchase.

Jesus knew much about sacrifice, and it took more than a saved allowance for a reason far greater than an iPad.

God's messenger, the Prophet Isaiah, spoke of the suffering, death, and resurrection of God's servant the long-awaited Messiah.

Jesus's life and mission fulfilled these words given way before he was even born. Isaiah said he would be crushed, wounded, and would sacrifice his life so that our sin could be forgiven.

And Jesus did just that—he paid the ultimate price, so that you could have eternal life.

Your life was Jesus's reward, and you were worth it.
